1. <b>Call to Order and Opening Roll Call</b> Gupta: meeting called to order at 8:04		
2. <b>Adoption of the Agenda</b> Gupta: objections to adoption of agenda? None.

4. <b>Open Student Forum</b> Sam J: I'm a campaigner for teach for America, I'm going to circulate some contact cards and a sheet for you guys to have. If you could fill those out that'd be really helpful. We won't flood your e-mail box, we're just trying to get a feel for what kind of people we have at Penn State. I'm here to talk about a serious problem that we have with out educational system. Across our country, the youth of our Nation is not receiving the education that they deserve. There is a huge disparity between the number of kids graduating high school in a place like where I grew up and a place like State College. So there is a serious problem with educational inequity. Teach for America is a national organization dedicated to closing the education gap in our nation. Our teacher's work relentlessly inside the classroom to bring the students up to par. It's a very financially viable option. It's open to all types of people because Teach for America provides all the training for the program. This organization is really sustainable because we have new people coming in every year. If you have any questions, definitely ask me. Our next application is on January 18 <sup>th</sup> , thanks for listening guys. Brett Fisher: I'm running for State College borough council, the election is this Tuesday, I'd like to take your questions now, but one of the reasons I'm running is because I want to bring student representation to the council. You've seen a bunch of anti-students policies go through the council, so I want to change that. I think this is a great opportunity for students to get involved. I think we have to do something about the new policy that's going through soon. I encourage you to ask the mayoral candidates about the constitutionality of the ordinance that is being considered. My vision once I'm elected is to get a lot of feedback from the student body and you guys in particular about how we can incorporate students and consult students during the creation of those policies. There are a couple glaring issues with this new ordinance, and I think this is an example of when students really weren't consulted. Pellicciotta: some candidates you're running against have years of experience, what experience do you have? Fisher: when you get a student elected, obviously I'll be younger than your peers, but students are the largest demographic in the community, so I feel that really qualifies me. I think it's also about the commitment I'm willing to put into it. That's probably why we haven't had students successful in the past. Pellicciotta: on your campaign website, you say the borough is anti-student, how do you plan to cooperate when you're already making those accusations? Fisher: I think some consultation should have occurring when this ordinance was being drafted.

6. <b>Special Presentations</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Mayoral Candidate Speeches and Q&amp;A Goreham: I was looking at your agenda, and I just want to say that I was at campus night out, and I thought it was a wonderful event, and I appreciate that you're spending money on the elections awareness day. I was raised in Indiana, I went to George Washington University, I got into a career of corporate communication, moved to State College in 1993 and this is where I've been ever since. I've really enjoyed my time on borough council. I want to be your mayor, I'd like to continue to represent you, I am aware of the issues that face State College in the future. I like being interviewed by journalism students. I'm interested in building the community, and in collaboration. I think the strengths and weaknesses of State College are the same thing, we are a mosaic of different ages, races, careers, ethnic backgrounds, gender preference. When we're interacting and communicating, man it's powerful. It expands our life experience and makes us cohesive. But when we pull apart and only see the world through our own perspective, then we're very weak. So I think the mayor's job is to build connections and overcome the natural barriers that exist when you only have your own perspective. Are there questions? Goreham: We would welcome your applications, that's definitely a big time commitment. We would welcome you to apply for the different boards and committees that we have that are run by citizens. That would be great. We'd be really happy to have you on our board.

Wilson: I heard you earlier talking about building community; do you have any concrete ways of creating communication lines in the community?

Goreham: I would be very welcoming, open door policy. I'd like to talk about any issues that emerge, have a regular meeting with student reps. Also engage and work together with students on projects that come from campus, I'm working with ecoaction on a few things. I'd love to work with you about campus projects if I'm mayor. There are many areas where we could benefit from the wonderful ideas that you create here. We need new ideas.

Andrews: How do you plan to make the laws of State College, residency and so forth, how do you plan to make those much more student friendly, because a lot of them seem to be really discriminatory

Goreham: that ordinance, which came out of a report called sustainable neighborhoods, It's online on our website, that ordinance is not going to pass. I agree with you, and it's really because of the response from students that made me read it more thoroughly and realized how from another perspective it looked onerous. We've talked with other council members, the ordinance is out the window. We need to work on it together to fix these problems. The end result is to build us a closer community not to keep us apart.

Perugini: It doesn't seem like many students vote in these elections, so why should you reach out to us at all?

Goreham: you're right! You guys need to contact me and speak with me. Life is busy for all of us, but students really need to get more involved in the borough. We have not had the outreach that we need to have maybe. As mayor I don't have any legislative authority, but I do have the ability to represent the face of state college.

Joe Wakeley: I was cofounder of the state college area YMCA, I was founder and coach of the swim team, I was founder of the pool swim teams, my wife and I have 5 children (4 who have come to Penn State). I have three points here that I'd like to talk about. Empowering students in local government by getting at least one student on every commission, and if that's not possible, then I would propose that one student would be permitted to attend all those meetings with representation there. I'd also like to improve the lives of borough residents by adding more bike paths in the area. I'd also like to revitalize the condition of volunteerism to help in various areas in the borough. Relative to the ordinance, I would propose that we investigate other universities that have the same problems, and see if they have solved them and how. Also for the west end I've working very extensively with students, I planned for the west end I think it would be a low cost, productive area for the students. To give the whole project to grad students or honors students to see how they could solve the problem in the west end of state college.

Why do I say that, because I've worked with grad and honors students at Penn state, and I find them to very knowledgeable? I was working one day with computers, and looking at some data, and a student came and looked over my shoulder and said he could write me a program that would do my data for me. It was very nice. I also worked with a math student, the lab was in the forefront of the tech building, and they developed some hardware that was used by the navy, I asked this student I gave him some parameters and said can he develop a mathematic relationship for this system, and he did. He solved the whole problem. I know it's a big problem, but I think the proper group of students could solve that problem and do a very good job. Contacting the people in that area, drawing up their wants and needs, see what they want, evaluate what's there now, and see what can be done by way of change. When I was on council I went to architecture dept, and they were studying interior room design. It was very romantic, it was very nice. I think the same type of thinking could go in and develop a solution to this problem. If we cannot put a student officially on an authorities board, I would put them in as a volunteer, to voice concerns if they arise.

Sam L (teach for America guy): I know our nation has a problem with our power grid, there are ideas about providing power to state college in alternate means, do you have ideas about that?

Wakeley: My son-in-law is involved in that, he has just recently gone to China, Japan, Brazil, S. Korea, Netherlands, France, Germany, Russia, everyone is interested in the power grids. That's what his company does. This company was founded in 1929, so I have a direct connection with that very problem; I think he could be very helpful with that problem.

Dove: Would your lack of recent experience on the borough council lead to any issues you think?

Wakeley: People are people, so I don't think so. I was involved with the building of things and making changes. I don't see a gap, personally. If you looked my life in 1993, you might be able to find a gap, but I don't feel that there is one.

Andrews: I move to extend the time for questions by 5 minutes.

Loewner: I object. I don't think we should give one candidate more time than the other. Vote by hands. Time not extended.

Gupta: discussion

Perugini: I just want to say that our committee has been working closely with these other orgs, and they've been doing a great job so far, so I just want to commend all those orgs.

Ragland: yeah and if you guys know any more definitely tell us.

Bonewell: motion to end debates. Seconded.

- Resolution 17 – Campus Night Out Funding
 

Ragland: this is also another mix up. He didn't get my final copy of things that changed, so the names were wrong on there. It should also be \$3075. We didn't get a chance before Campus Night Out to pass legislation, so we teamed up with programming committee, so this money is coming from both of our committees. They took the money out of their fall festival budget.

Smith: are the numbers correct on here?

Ragland: \$3075

Miller: can you explain where the extra money comes from?

Ragland: the best event part just goes up \$60 more.

Andrews: it still doesn't add up. It doesn't make sense.

Ragland: \$500 from OPP, we're having some adding problems here apparently. So best event goes to 1480, which gives \$3075 total. And then from both committees is \$3727.

Gupta: we'll move into debate.

Bard: I wanted to commend everyone who put work into this event. I loved going out, I personally learned a lot at the event. I was a little disappointed not to see more of the assembly there; I think it's important that we really back each other when we do stuff like this.

Ragland: To follow up, I was definitely happy with the event. I thought it was a good start also, so next year we know what we should do and not do. Next year, we'll have a better lay out and perfect it. I think everyone who helped out, especially our freshman reps, thank you everyone.

Smith: motion to end debate. Second.

VOTE: passes 34-0-0.
  - Policy 8 – Attendance Policy
 

Dove: Yet another attendance policy, bylaws change so it needs 2/3 vote. Basically we add into the bylaws the unexcused absences section, it explains what is an unexcused absence. All this is still up to the discretion of the secretary, so within the first couple weeks maybe there are excuses for stuff like this. Any questions?

Paseka: with the thing after three, what is it for excused?

Dove: after 2 for excused absences.

Paseka: oh ok so this is just for unexcused absences.

Byrne: will this be retroactive?

Dove: no.

Andrews: what's the point of having excused absences if they're not excused. I'm confused. Why are we being punished for excused absences.

Dove: my thought was that is someone has an excused absence, then they'll be able to prove that it's legitimate, and if not then the assembly will be able to see that.

Gupta: move into debate.

Bonewell: I'd like to amend line 41 to say after "five" excused absences because it includes committee meetings. Seconded.

Benjy: I object because the three is on top of the two excused absences so that's a lot of absences.

Dove: I think three is a high enough number, that's more than one week. This is just saying after three you'll be reviewed, not that you'll be immediately kicked out.

Miller: I support extending it to 5, because all of our exams are at night in engineering. I feel like that means twice a semester I'll have to come before assembly and say that to everyone.

Paseka: Going off that point, I agree that it's difficult that you have to explain your reasoning, but you're not getting kicked off the assembly, so you guys are hear often enough so it shouldn't be a problem for you.

Pellicciotta: its my understanding that you can have your exams moved for attending UPUA, it is under University excused absences. So after three, your not representing your constituents, so you should have to come before assembly.

Andrews: Regarding number of absences, it's very easy for people here to miss 5 things in the assembly, so people could be up here 3 or 4 times to explain themselves.

Wilson: I do agree that 3 is substantial because like Jess was saying we're supposed to represent our constituents which we can't do if we're not here enough, maybe it'll make them take ownership for their constituents.

Bonewell: I want this to be changed to 5 instead of three, because our attendance record runs the entire year, that's 30 weeks. It's just a hassle to have to do this every time. Committee meetings also, I think it's unnecessary to waste everyone's time.

Lombard: when you're coming before the assembly to here, it's not going to take forever, maybe 2 minutes per person, not a big deal. It won't be a huge issue.

Kuchler: it seems to me that debate is over exams, so if you could get a note from professor or something then it could be proven to be legitimate, and that could be bypassed.

Wilson: we all applied for a commitment, so if you're not ready to handle that commitment then maybe you shouldn't be here, so you shouldn't miss too many meetings.

Dove: I agree, I think we all need to know what everyone else is doing in the assembly, so if someone is absent for 5 meetings, then that's concerning to me, so I would like to know why people are missing meetings so much. So I don't see why there's not much debate about this. This is a choice to do this, you're not being forced to.

Bonewell: I would like to say that I think it's going to be a huge waste of my time, and I'd like to motion to end debate on my amendment. Seconded.

Gupta: ok we'll vote my show of hands on the amendment to change it from 3 to 5. Passes by 18-14-1. So the policy will change to 5 excused absences.

Pellicciotta: I urge everyone to vote for this, because theoretically you could have an excused absence every single assembly, so I think this is important. It's about doing what's right, so I urge everyone to vote for this and be accountable.

Andrews: it really seems to be a waste of time, Vicki is here to verify that they are excused absences.

Boyer: I agree with Jess, I think the policy right now is way too vague. I think holding being accountable is really a good idea.

Crawford: coming before the assembly should be at the discretion of the secretary also. How about that?  
Loewner: it would be also for assembly to pass judgment as to whether the representative is still representing their constituents. Even if those excuses were already verified. As to Mr. Crawford, I don't think that's necessary. Just a few short minutes, and that's adding another level of discretion.  
Paseka: It's not because people are missing because of a test, but if you don't see someone for a long time, but there has been a person who has not been here the entire semester, so I'd like to have that person come before assembly and explain to us where they are.  
Dave S: One of my major concerns about this is that you're bringing members of assembly in front of their peers and allowing their peers to question their reliability. So a member of the assembly can come and tell you their excuses, but if their not proving these reasons and peers are allowed to question their credibility, it could be damaging to our morale.  
Dove: as far as damaging group cohesion, I think that people being absent all the time is more damaging.  
Andrews: It seems that the person's constituents should be the ones qualified to judge these people.  
Bonewell: I respectfully disagree with you representative Andrews, because at a certain point even if the absences are excused, then you might not be a functional part of the organization anymore. If someone can do a better job than you just because of your situation.  
Dove: motion to end debate. Second.  
VOTE: passes 27-7-0.

Smith: I move to bring resolution 18 to the floor.  
Loewner: I object. I would like to remind everyone that bringing something to the floor by 2/3 is what we refer to as emergency legislation, and this doesn't seem like an emergency. SO I don't think we should bring it to the floor.  
Gupta: let's vote by hands. It passes 26-7-0, so you may introduce it.  
Smith: This resolution just states that over the past few weeks, Penn State has called on UPUA to respond to the nuisance ordinance, and thus far we haven't done anything formally with it, and I think we need to respond to our constituents, so this is just saying that we are dedicating ourselves to look into it, attending sessions, and hopefully ending up with most student friendly solution. It's more just a reaffirmation of what we're going to be doing.  
Ragland: what did Ms. Goreham mean when she said they threw it out?  
Smith: I think that was just more rhetorical. They haven't really thrown it out, it will be voted on in December.  
Dove: About recommended course of action, isn't that just restating the goal of GA committee already.  
Smith: Yes I guess it is a little redundant, this is really just a formal statement of our commitment.  
Goldsmith: doesn't OCSU already exist as a liaison between borough and students?  
Smith: OCSU does do this kind of work, but the different is that we are all elected reps and they are not.  
Perugini: can anyone else sit on this committee?  
Smith: yes, it's not forming a new committee, but I'm open to anyone assisting, looking into this, whatever. I encourage participation of other reps.  
Andrews: do you think assembly should make any formal declaration of support for this down the line?  
Smith: at this point we need to just further look into it, and meet with pertinent individuals.  
Andrews: could we say that eventually we will develop a stance on the ordinance and present it o assembly to vote on.  
Smith: you could make that amendment, but it says that the committee will report o the assembly about any progress made. I think your comment is already included in that.  
Pellicciotta: I think that that should come at a later time. We need to work on getting our opinion now. So thin that should come later.  
Dove: on line 27, it says members of committee will attend all borough council meetings, is there a measure for enforcement of that?  
Smith: That is mainly a statement of commitment, obviously there's going to e things that come up. The only reps that are required at this point are the ten off campus reps, so I don't think it would be appropriate to mandate all these meetings. I think we can take it in good faith that members are dedicated to this.  
Gupta: move into debate.  
Dove: I move to strike the word "all" from line 28. Second. Objections? None.  
Loewner: I move to strike that entire sentence that's remaining, because if its in here then it will be considered absences it they are not there. Second.  
Pellicciotta: I object because it's charging the committee with this role, I think it more of a whole, not the individuals.  
Smith: I oppose that also, I think we could develop better wording, but yeah it's just the whole committee.  
Gupta: we'll vote by show of hands to strike that whole sentence. Fails 3-31-0, so it will stay.  
Boyer: motion to end debate.  
VOTE: passes 33-1-0

Smith: I would like to bring resolution 19 to the floor by 2/3. Objections? None.  
Smith: this is just show-cause budget legislation for the local elections awareness event which will be this Friday. This money is already allocated in our budget, but this is just showing what It'll be used for.  
Dove: What's the first sentence about?  
Smith: that's a typo. I apologize.  
Gupta: move into debate.  
Bonewell: I move to amend line 17 change the word "fair" to the word "are". Objections? None.  
Bello: I motion to end the debate. Second. Objections? None.  
VOTE: passes 32-1-1.
