5. **Report by the President**
 - o Working on filling positions. Thank you to all of these people who are leaving. Hillary, Matt, Jim, Carolyn, Will.
 - o We've accomplished a lot of goals this year. I hope we get tenant landlord, legal services and online book swap up. I'm very proud of some other new initiatives too.
 - o We have quite the agenda. Over Christmas break get refreshed! Come back with some new goals. Production next semester is up to you!
6. **Special Presentations**
 - o Jason Kleinwaks/Huzefa/Bonnie
 - Jason- Here to present tenant landlord mediation center. Bonnie is the director of the mediation program. This will give tenants a no cost alternative to taking problems to court. Currently, there is no outlet except hiring a lawyer. The need is definitely there. Gail made us do our research, we have 20 cases per semester, there are another 200 cases per year. There is an advising component that has advisers assigned to every case that comes in. They are trained in this area to get the problem worked out. Our goal is to settle it. If no progress is made, we will make the decision to send it to the mediation center. This decision will be based on the amount of money and how severe the problem is.
 - Huzefa- There are advantages to landlords as well including free access, avoiding lawsuits, create a preferred landlord program, at the end landlords still maintain legal rights. This isn't the end all, but it will ease tensions. Legal affairs will act as a screening process so junk cases aren't taken. We don't want to waste money. In terms of finances, we have money from the borough and are looking for grants and funds.
 - Bonnie- I want you to be comfortable with who we are. We've been operating since 1978. We do all kinds of disputes. We also do the pre-trial release program, alternative for youth, etc. We would have to work out the details of the mediation. We want people to understand what they're getting into. The way the process works is an opening statement, each party is given an uninterrupted opportunity to present their side, and then we brainstorm solutions. There is an equal playing field. We will probably have two mediators at each time. Our goal is to have a written agreement and a referral outcome. We have to work on making this legally binding.
 - Questions
 - Sam Miller- When do you plan on writing the contract?
 - o Jason- As soon as we can hammer out the agreements.
 - Ralph Crivello- What other processes is mediation used for?
 - o Bonnie- A lot of custody agreements, discrimination in housing, neighbor, contract disputes, victim-offender. We'll consider almost anything.
 - Sean Meloy- How are you funded?
 - o Bonnie- Mediation pays for a lot of it. 69% funded by tax dollars. A lot is donations and a sliding fee scale.
 - Andrew Karasik- What safeguards will be in place to ensure that UPUA's money is not used for cases supplied to the general populous?
 - o Huzefa- The borough's money will go to non-students. About 95% of tenants in state College are students.
 - Matt Smith- You made a comment about the fact that 2 people pay. IS this an incentive for the landlord as well?
 - o Bonnie- Absolutely. They don't have to pay for anything so that is a major incentive.
 - Joann Olsen- Is this for grad students as well?
 - o Jason- Yes, any tenant in the borough. Any student as well. UPUA dollars will only go towards people paying the activity fee.
 - Andrew Karasik- The problem is that UPUA money cannot go to grad students.

- Jason- Grad students will be paid for by the borough.
 - Steve Lucas- This sounds really good, but do you see any downfalls?
 - Jason- The only problem I foresee is a lack of interest for the landlords. I think the fact that they're saving money should be enough incentive. Bonnie also has experience with this.
 - Bonnie- Many times they don't want to spend the time or the money. I think early on if they see a benefit they will keep coming. Many times when they go to court they are ordered to pay, but they don't.
 - Huzefa- We've talked to a fair amount of landlords. Most of them seem like they're on board with this.
 - Jason- Honestly, most likely we'll see smaller landlords in town. We sat down with them this summer. They were very receptive to this.
 - Steve Lucas- It seems like a lot of the leases are really unfair to renters. Is there anyway to rectify that?
 - Jason- All the leases in town are legally written. There is really nothing to be done. That is the purpose of this program.
 - Mary Edgington
 - When I first arrived Ralph asked me to address the assembly. So he still wanted me to come even though I just did.
 - HUB Advisory Board- We elected co-chairs, Chris Nock is one. We had a very long meeting today. It is really coming along. It is an advisory board for myself and the director for the Paul-Robeson Cultural Center. I think we've decided on the composition. We are looking at some other projects. You might remember STA travel and we put in the computer store. We had the computer store and the id+ office. The vendors don't know yet so I can't tell you yet. We're also talking about space assignments. Pay attention to this if it involves you. We're also looking at the Corner Pocket and LateNight.
 - SAFB- After the Nov. meeting we decided we need some working meetings. We've been meeting a few times since. Our proposal should be presented Friday.
 - I'm also on LateNight Policy Committee and the Class Ring Committee
 - Thank you for all you've done for me. You guys have done some great work. Shermanski don't you think we'll bring a Rose Bowl trophy home!
 - Questions
 - Chris Morell- Do you see us expanding our office?
 - Space is always an issue. I think it's a great question, and something we can look into.
 - Ralph Crivello- You talked about the two vendors. Is that all that will be entertained for the space?
 - We're just going with them this time.

- Policy # 9 – Constitutional Amendments (Commission and Merger)
- I was charged with an ad hoc committee. The best approach was to draft a working definition. We wanted to insert it in the constitution for complete clarity. You can read the definition. This gives maximum flexibility. It's a fairly vague definition, but that's good. The assembly is the only thing that can start a commission. Also, the membership must be in the resolution. Additionally, the bottom part deals with the merger. We added clarification there too. This expanded the board to 9. They have complete control over the conduct process.
 - Questions (none)
 - Discussion
 - Andrew Karasik- You have an amendment under additional recommendations. Forget new clause 5. Constitution currently states that at large members should attend SOCC, so this needs to be removed. The next expands Arbitration board to deal with conduct.

 - Passes with a vote of 32-0-0
 - Confirmation of Executive Appointments
 - UPUA SAFB Voting Member
 - Ralph-replacing Matt.
 - Questions
 - Richard Shermanski- What are your goals?
 - I am looking to represent this body. Personally I have no goals going in except the organizations.
 - Andrew Karasik- Will you be going to this Friday's meeting?

 - Mike Wallace- What experience do you have that qualifies you for this position?
 - I've been in student government for 4 years. I was elected by this assembly to serve as the voice. I do support WallePalooza

 - Vote
 - Passes unanimously
 - Heads of the Board of Arbitration
 - Joshua- currently co-chair for SOCC. I've been a part since it's conception. I have served as the conduct justice and co-chair for the past few years. We're now live. I'm looking to make this a smooth transition. I'd like it to go into effect the next academic year.

- Katie- currently co-chair for SOCC. Active role to contact student organizations if they violated a conduct code. WE've been forming a new discipline process. I look forward to the merger.
- Arbitrators
 - Luke- Conduct justice for the past 2 years. I'm looking to take a more active role. I'm taking on Katie's old position. I'm looking forward to the new policies and structure.
 - Kathryn- 2nd year involved in SOCC. I've been drafting legislation for a few years. I'm excited about this merger and working with all of you.
 - Justin- My first semester here and with SOCC. I think student orgs and the good name of the university deserved an unbiased judgment for matters like so.
 - Alyssa- Joined SOCC this year to be a part of the student's involved in student organizations. I'm looking forward to the merger.
 - Ce- First year of SOCC. I want to perpetuate a sense of equality and fairness at Penn State.
 - Questions for All-
 - Matt Smith- Would any of you be willing to speak to Mr. Foley's involvement.
 - Katie- He seems excited, but was not available today. He is ready to move forward with us.
 - Chris Nock- What factors delayed the merger?
 - Jason- This is a big move and we are a young organization. We wanted to make sure that everything was what we and you wanted to see. It took a little bit of time to reach the medium.
 - Megan Quinn- What year is Thomas Foley? IT seems that many of you are seniors, how do you see your future?
 - Junior. We're confident. There are enough people that can carry on the things we've worked for.
 - Chris Morell- You've coming from Student Affairs. Do you guys think that you can honestly say that you'll have no influence from what was SOCC? Will you have an independent school of thought?
 - Josh- I'm confident that any of these members wouldn't be influenced by SOCC's process. We have always rendered decisions without influence. Only me and Katie would have experienced that.
 - Andrew Karasik- In addition to your current duties, one of your duties will be to adjudicate disputes between different entities of UPUA. Are you prepared to take on that initiative?
 - Luke- We're excited to do something different and for every person to be able to get involved not just the co-chairs. We can give insight and an unbiased opinion. We will regulate as needed.
 - Ralph Crivello- What are you looking forward to most that UPUA can offer?
 - Josh- It gives us more responsibility. We're looking to make that change. It is very important for students to have a voice. We will get the chance to amend our process to show that.
 - Richard Shermanski- Ce can you give me more background?
 - I don't have a judicial background. In high school I was in a debate. Even though I'm relatively inexperienced I think I can develop my skills. I can maintain neutrality.
 - Valarie Russell- Will you be preparing yourselves to be the heads?
 - Justin- I plan on being a part of the board next year and hopefully becoming a head once they leave
 - Discussion
 - Joshua-
 - Andrew Karasik-The ID committee interviewed everyone. They were all members of SOCC. They all expressed an interest and a determination to immerse themselves in our constitution. We passed the entire group. The committee felt that this is a merger in the right direction. We are doing the right thing to take on this responsibility. Some of the constrictions of the merger agreement were somewhat bothersome. This is necessary and beneficial to our organization. We recommend that they be appointed to the board.
 - Chris Nock- What slowed down the merger?
 - Ralph- they were concerned about ownership. They will fully own the process. There were some specifics about budgeting, etc. They were very thorough. Katie was sick for awhile. It took about a month longer than initially anticipated. This opens up a lot of opportunities. This is part of the negotiation process. Dr. Graham raised some extra concerns. It was based on the negotiation.
 - Christopher Morell- Do we get to debate them as a whole?
 - Val- Each will be individual.
 - Andrew Karasik- I would request that the group and merger as a whole be discussed.
 - Benji Lombard- Within ID, we had some stipulations regarding certain elements of this merger. However, we feel like it's in each groups best interest.
 - Ralph Crivello- You were all given a copy of the merger agreement. There is no other student court on campus. These students are in the process of training. I think that is a benefit. We have to recognize that they are the only group on campus with this experience. It's a right step forward for the student body.
 - Chris Morell- Who is going to teach them? I'm all for the merger, but they have the deck stacked now. We can't put any of our people in there. When we interviewed the board themselves, their advisor was with them. I was a little scared that there wasn't a trust between the advisors and the board themselves. Who will teach them how to do their job? Will there be an outside influence?
 - Jennifer- I was present to advocate for the students. I wasn't planning on interjecting, unless something outrageous happened. In my role as their advisor, I'm there to educate and advise. I'm not there to try and take student voice away.
 - William Barr- Did you find any outrageous questions?
 - No.
 - Chris Nock- Will we expand the role of SOCC?
 - Ralph Crivello- It includes roles of SOCC, but in the area of judicial affairs they will hopefully be involved. They should assume that role in the future. They seemed very receptive of the idea. They want engaged and diverse students.
 - Andrew Karasik- I am for this merger, but it's a merger between students. That's the very important thing here. We're transferring power from student to student. Jennifer was very respectful. This merger is moving in the right direction. Of course things could have been handled better, but we need to move forward.

- Board Discussion
 - Richard Shermanski- As a whole I think they're great. I've known Mattes for a long time, she's very hard working. Ce reminds me of a young me. I think this is a top notch group.
 - Gavin Keirans- I sat in on Josh and Katie's interviews. They're more than capable. I suggest that you go forward with them.
 - Sean Meloy- I was very reassured that they're looking to pass on the torch. They will take on head arbiters duties as well as UPUA's.
 - Andrew Karasik- Do you have a timeline to pass the 9th?
 - Gavin- ASAP.
 - Individual Votes
 - Joshua- passes 31-1-1
 - Katie- passes-30-1-1
 - Luke- passes 30-2-0
 - Kathryn- passes 29-1-2
 - Justin- passes 29-3-0
 - Alyssa- passes 29-1-2
 - Ce- passes 28-3-1
 - Take the Oath of Office
 - Ralph Crivello- They must hold office hours. A member of the board of arbitration should attend the meetings so if a dispute arises one will at least be knowledgeable.
- Policy # 4 – Recreational and Intramural Sports Commission
 - Introduction- Gavin Keirans
 - There's a clear need to look at these programs. With the facilities fee it's important that there's an outlet for this voice. UPUA typically doesn't dive into this need, but it's important. It's unique in its kind that we're having a commission where we bring in different faculty and administrators. We'll have this product together. I've been working a lot with Tom Lovenz.
 - Questions
 - Sam Loewner- On point 8 it says Diversity and Student Life has commission. Why? How will oversight be necessary?
 - Gavin- this was put in after the fact. The idea was that student life would deal with this and offer their insight. It's a bureaucratic formality.
 - Discussion
 - Sam Miller- This is good to see how a commission will work. I support the passage of this policy.
 - Sam Loewner- Great passage.
 - Vote
 - Passes 28-0-1
- Resolution # 19 – Funding Tenant-Landlord Mediation Center
 - Introduction- Sam Miller
 - It's important to keep in mind that UPUA Legal Affairs and the Borough worked very hard to come up with a structure that worked for both. If it changes much, they will have to start at square one. That could cause it not starting in January. Look at the amendments made by steering committee. I would support passing all those.
 - Questions
 - Richard Shermanski- Where did \$5,000 come from.?
 - Sam Miller- This came up initially. \$5,000 from Stop Gap was set aside for that.
 - Benjamin Lombard- Why was director of executive board for 2009 struck?
 - Gavin- The thought process was so it was mandatory to attend meetings. It's our biggest initiative to date. Jason will be the director. It's just more formal.
 - Ralph Crivello- Does the president have any individuals in mind for directorship?
 - Gavin- Jason will be the director.
 - Joann Olsen- Is this for people just living within the legal municipality of the township?
 - Matt Lachman- any resident of state college is eligible, any undergraduate is legal. If living outside and not an undergraduate you are not eligible.
 - Discussion
 - Ralph Crivello- I move to adopt the amendments listed on this paper.
 - Amendments pass. To clarify \$4,000 should be allocated for student mediation.
 - Sam Loewner- This is a wise piece of legislation to pass. This was a cornerstone of many of our campaigns. It would do students a great amount of justice.
 - Vote
 - Passes 28-0-0
- Resolution # 18 – Presidential Dinner (*brought to floor by 2/3s*)
 - Introduction- Gavin Keirans
 - Similar to that of former cabinet of student leaders. That was always a key of getting together so you could fill positions well. We could also team up and get support. There were negatives associated by some people, but we will be running it. It will enhance our mission.
 - Questions-
 - Benjamin Lombard- Where will this be held?
 - Gavin- It will be informal. It's not going to be a huge dinner.
 - Jim Byrne- That's 200 junior bacon cheese burgers.
 - Richard Shermanski- What about the presidents of the commonwealth campuses?
 - Gavin- they don't did with UP issues. The president of CCSG will be there.
 - Ralph Crivello- How will you spread UPUA's name?
 - Gavin- These are some of the main groups on campus, so they will know what they are. The focus is to share ideas though.
 - Steve Lucas- Causal had a lot of problems with UPUA last year. What as president will you do to better our reputation?
 - Gavin- I think we've been working on that. A lot of the major groups on campus we have a good relationship with. The only group I forsee having a problem with us is UPAC.

- Andrew Karasik- Why isn't the cabinet here now?
- Chris Morell- Where is the event taking place?
 - Gavin- I believe 320 HUB.
- William Barr- What is PRIDE?
 - Valarie Russell- It was an initiative to promote sportsmanship.
- Steve Lucas- What was SOS, College Republicans and College Democrats in this?
 - Gavin- I wanted the most vocal and active groups on campus. I'm not necessarily looking for representative bodies. I think they have a presence on campus. I see it a positive for them to work with other organizations.
- Sam Miller- Do you think UPUA will fund this on a regular basis?
 - Gavin- I've thought about both. If it has to be done in UPUA that isn't a bad thing. But if other groups want to have a chance, I wouldn't be opposed.
- Mark Cannon- Is it just the presidents?
 - Gavin- The presidents or someone they send.
- Discussion
 - Ellie Okkelberg- How do you feel about Latino Caucus not being on here?
 - Steve Lucas- I move to add Latino Caucus and change Speak Out to Rainbow Roundtable. Rainbow Roundtable was just formed.
 - Amendment passes.
 - Nick Mance- We and the president should be commended because it shows us taking the lead as the main body at Penn State.
- Vote
 - Jim Byrne- Never brought to the floor.
 - Ralph Crivello- motioned to suspend rules.
 - Steve Lucas objects on the grounds that some groups aren't represented.
 - Rules are suspended based on over a 2/3 vote of 24-1-0.
 - Passes by a vote of 24-3-4.
- Policy # 10 – UPUA Spring 2009 Budget (*brought to floor by 2/3s*)
 - Introduction- Andrew Karasik
 - This budget came through ID committee. You should all have the new version in front you, on page 3 under remaining unrestricted there should be a number in parenthesis. It was passed by ID by a vote of 6-0-0 with an amendment to change facilities to 200 and ID to 200. Nick is okay with that.
 - Ralph Crivello- Can you restate the clarification?
 - Gavin- If you look at the Exec board portion, \$1,000 is on hold until they have a concrete explanation. The reasoning is because I didn't think it was fair for me to give a completely discretionary budget.
 - Questions
 - Richard Shermanski- What is apparel?
 - Hillary Gupta- Jackets and lapels. This would supplement some of the costs.
 - Matt Smith- I'm against enrichment of us on the behalf of student activities fee. We need to be careful about what we spend our money on. I would be weary about purchasing these.
 - Discussion
 - Gavin- I am going to have to echo what Gavin said. Originally, what was involved with programming was more discretionary. He looked at their budget and part of it was apparel. That much money shouldn't happen with this tight budget.
 - William Barr- I move to strike apparel on page 1 of policy 10.
 - Ralph Crivello objects.
 - Sean Leonard- They have the best intentions with this. UPUA is still young and needs to get its name out there. Not everyone reads The Collegian. As we progress, having something on ourselves that says we're UPUA would be helpful. This will help promote UPUA. I think it's very helpful to the long-term success.
 - Chris Morell- UPAC has "beautiful" blue polos.
 - Nick Mance- I don't think we should totally strike it, we should just reduce it.
 - Hillary Gupta- I took into consideration about what you all want. I looked around at how much they would be. If you want apparel don't strike it but lower it.
 - Gavin- Hillary did her research. We need to specify what this is for. We have to look at everything that we spend money on.
 - William Barr- I don't see apparel being much different.
 - Ellie Okkelberg- Our first vision is promotion. We're saying we want it, and apparel is one of the best ways.
 - Matt Smith- This is not student affairs money. This is student activities fee money. I originally thought the money was coming from student affairs. The only reason I'm against apparel for ourselves because it's not enriching the students but the organization.
 - Michael Wallace- We all pay the student activity fee anyway.
 - William Barr- Student Affairs comes from our money anyway.
 - Megan Quinn- Let's just by the shirts ourselves.
 - Steve Lucas- I recognize Rep. Smith's concerns. I think we can use them effectively. I do think it's important that we promote ourselves.
 - Richard Shermanski- We have to set up a day where we all wear it.
 - Chris Morell- I second what Richard says. I've seen something like this in Kern.
 - Michael Wallace- If we wear our shirts during a function that is benefiting students. IT shows we're together and markets us.
 - Sam Loewner- Regarding the marketing comments, I have serious concern about marketing ourselves with apparel. We've already gotten bad press about spending last year. SOS has criticized us in the past. If we have shirts with SAF money it will be a more noticeable waste. It's extremely noticeable.
 - Amy Sanders- I don't want to be embarrassed to wear these jackets.
 - Andrew Karasik- We can't be naive enough to think everyone can afford this. It adds legitimacy to UPAC with everyone wearing these shirts. It improves the organization's stature. The SAF amounts to 2.3 million dollars each semester. It combines money into a communal pot. Some get more than what they pay, others get nothing.
 - Amendment fails 7-15-5.

- Ralph Crivello- Amend apparel to \$1,250 to \$800.
 - Objections
 - Christopher Nock- Hillary came up with that number for a reason. People won't be less mad. If we're gonna spend money, let's spend money.
 - Colleen Smith- We either spend the money or we don't.
 - Ralph Crivello- The questions is what type of shirt we want. We can still subsidized with \$800. I do think promotion is important. Some cheaper things could be discussed.
 - Steve Lucas- Lowering the quality of the garment won't change anything.
 - Sam Miller- Where would the extra funding be allocated to?
 - Ralph- unrestricted.
 - John King- Can that go into programming's discretionary?
 - Ralph- with another amendment.
 - Mike Wallace- If we're that worried about the students being mad we don't have to keep them.
 - Hillary Gupta- Anytime I bring anything to the floor people try to strike money. How much do you want me to spend on anything I do? If you don't want me to spend money then don't have a programming committee.
 - Steve- Her committee has been over criticized.
 - Megan Quinn- I think this is unfortunate that it seems like a personal attack. Sometimes UPUA feels like they are entitled. As student leaders we have an entitlement.
 - Amendment fails by a vote of 5-19-3.
 - William Barr- Wallepalooza why is that \$65,000?
 - Gavin- They are now only getting \$2,000.
 - Andrew- What's going on for the ability of this organization for programming from UPAC?
 - Gavin- If we want to do a larger event I believe we can still go to UPAC. That would not be considered double dipping.
 - Richard Shermanski- Collegian Sudoku?
 - Gavin- That's already been approved.
 - Ralph Crivello- This is a very rough document. We have no established procedure for budgeting large amounts of money. We're working on this. It's hard to hold informal hearings. It's late so there's a lot of discretionary funding.

- Policy passes by a vote of 28-0-0

- Steering- Ralph Crivello
 - Sean Gordon donated \$25 to UPUA.
 - Update on ARHS- I attended their meeting and this motion was adopted. Vote on postponement of recreational facilities fee and discuss further on exact date in spring 2009. The discussions will be with UPUA outside of the format of a task force. The executive board will look into what outside of a task force means.
 - Questions
 - Andrew Karasik- Is there a chance Parker would veto it?
 - Ralph- Parker feels that there should be a task force. He talked about that.

- William Barr- Can we request ARHS to get a new liaison?
 - Ralph- I was the only one at the ARHS meeting. All on campus representatives are required to attend the ARHS meetings. All academic reps are required to go to their council meetings. All off-campus reps are required to attend borough councils. We are required to be in touch with our constituents. This meeting is just the beginning of your service. I was grilled by this at ARHS.
